### What is tamoxifen?

Tamoxifen is a selective estrogen-receptor modulator that is used to treat breast cancer. Studies on the pathophysiology of bipolar disorder have demonstrated abnormalities in protein kinase C (PKC) signaling in manic states. Inhibition of PKC can result in antimanic effects. Currently, tamoxifen is the only relatively specific PKC inhibitor that is available for human use and that is capable of crossing the blood-brain barrier.

### What is the evidence for tamoxifen?

Moderate quality evidence suggests large effects of greater improvement in acute mania symptoms with tamoxifen than with placebo, risperidone, haloperidol, olanzapine, cariprazine, lithium, carbamazepine, paliperidone, aripiprazole, asenapine, quetiapine, oxcarbazepine, licarbazepine, ziprasidone, valproate, verapamil, lamotrigine or topiramate. There were no differences in all-cause discontinuation of treatment.
